

Early Childhood Intervention (ECI) Programs

Region 17 is served by three (3) Early Childhood Intervention programs. Services depend on the needs of the child, aged birth through two years, and the needs of the family. Services for eligible children may include physical, occupational, and speech therapy; assessments; activities to develop cognitive, social/emotional, and self-help skills; adaptive equipment; and, transportation. Families are served through case management, training, counseling, and parent support groups.

Children ages birth to 22 years who live in Texas and have vision impairment may be eligible for services. BCP services focus on the child's needs outside of school.

Important information about cost of a low vision evaluation:

TTUHSC Ophthalmology listed above is the low vision clinic with whom Region 17 ESC contracts for low vision evaluations. If there has been a referral for a student's low vision evaluation that Region 17 ESC is to fund, the evaluation must be completed by the low vision eye specialist at TTUHSC Low Vision Clinic. The cost for any evaluation completed at any other low vision clinic will not be covered by Region 17 ESC.

Process for Low Vision Evaluation (LVE)

- 1. TVI evaluates student and, based on results, may recommend an LVE to student's ARD Committee; typically, once every 3 years.
- 2. ARD Committee makes a decision about TVI's LVE recommendation.
- 3. If approved, the TVI completes and submits an LVE referral form, with required SpEd Director signature, to Region 17 ESC Support Staff for VI.
- 4. Region 17 ESC Support Staff for VI makes an LVE appointment for the student and notifies both the student's family and the student's TVI of the appointment. CHANGES in appointment date/time MUST be made by the student's family directly with the Ophthalmology Office.
- 5. Family takes student to appointment. TVI typically attends appointment.
- 6. An LVE Report is sent to the student's family and TVI usually a few weeks after appointment. TVI follows the Report recommendations for school.
- 7. Region 17 orders recommended low vision devices; NO glasses/contacts.
